

SUGGESTED OUTLINES FOR VARIOUS TYPES OF MANUSCRIPTS

(Adapted from Bill REIMER April 9, 1992)

1. Formal Academic Papers or Articles (Hypothesis Testing)

- Introduction:
 - the problem
 - the research question
 - why it is important
- Theoretical Framework:
 - The theoretical context for the problem
 - How it has been dealt with in the literature
 - Strengths and weaknesses of how it has been dealt with
 - Justification for how you will examine it
 - Central research proposition(s)
- Research Design:
 - theoretical definitions
 - research design description
 - operationalizations
 - hypotheses
- Results of the research
- Discussion (interpretation) of the results
- Conclusions: summary of issues, and implications of the research

2. Descriptive Papers or Articles

- Introduction:
 - the problem
 - the research question
 - why it is important
- Theoretical Framework:
 - The theoretical context for the problem
 - How it has been dealt with in the literature
 - Strengths and weaknesses of how it has been dealt with
 - Identify the central research focus or question
- Major Issues to be dealt with (may be repeated a number of times):
 - Identify the issue
 - Describe and discuss the data and theory related to the issue
 - Discuss the implications of your data for the research question
- Overall implications of your findings and discussion
- Conclusions: summary of issues, and implications of the research

3. Client-oriented Reports

- (Possible executive summary: one page)
- Introduction:
 - the problem (as it occurs to the client)
 - objectives of the study
 - how you have organized the report
- Conceptualization of the problem (may require explaining how and why you have reconceptualized the problem as it occurs to the client)
- Research Approach
 - justification in client's language
 - description of research
- Results and interpretations of the research
- Overall conclusions of the research
- Recommendations
